This is the first report on Census of Meghalaya Government employees (as on 31st March, 1972) being issued by the Directorate of Economics and Statistics of the Government of Meghalaya. Though the publication of such reports is quite usual with other State Governments, this could not be attempted so far in Meghalaya due to the shortage of personnel in the Directorate. It is proposed to make it an annual feature and to bring it out regularly.

The report was prepared under the supervision of Shri R. P. Kharmujai, Officer on Special Duty. Shri P. K. Baruah, Research Officer designed the proforma and prepared the report assisted by Smti. A. Kharsyntiew, Inspector of Statistics.

We would like to place on record our commendation and appreciation of their work.

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INTRODUCTION

Chapter 1

- 1.1. The Census of Meghalaya Government Employees was among the first tasks undertaken by the newly established Directorate of Economics and Statistics of the State Government. As elsewhere in India, this Census will be an annual feature in the work programme of the State Directorate. The aim of the Census is to collect data that would throw light on varied aspects of the Government employees apart from measuring the changing volume of State Government Employment. These information provide the useful tools for decision making by Government in running the administration. The Census of Meghalaya Government Employees as on the 31st March, 1972 is the first in the series of the annual censuses to be undertaken. For the purpose of All-India comparison, the 31st March, of the year has been chosen as the reference date.
- 1.2. The scope of the present Census is somewhat limited in the sense that only certain information have been collected. This was because of the realization of the many limitations inherent in the administrative set up of a new State both at the reporting as at the receiving end, as well as of the need to bring out the report in minimum time. In course of time, the scope would be enlarged to meet the requirement of data according to changes in time.
- 1.3. The data collected in the present Census relates to sex, service status, tenure of service, pay scales, basic pay, emoluments and castes and tribes. Also, an important feature is the information regarding employees taken on deputation and direct recruit by Meghalaya Government.
- 1.4. For the purpose of the Census, a Meghalaya Government Employee has been defined as that employed under the State Government on the reference date and paid directly by the State Government. This includes a person employed on permanent, temporary, work-charged or contract basis. A casual employee for whom a service roll is maintained was also brought under the purview of the Census.
- 1.5. For the purpose of this Census Report, an employee holding a non-permanent post on the reference date is treated as temporary though he might be confirmed elsewhere. It may be pointed out that an employee holding currently a temporary post but confirmed in the parent department should have been treated as permanent. But as in a large number of cases the reporting offices could not give this information, many confirmed employees may have come to be classified as temporary. The number of permanent employees indicated in this Report thus does not represent the exact number of the permanent incumbents under the State Government.

- 1.6. The basic data were collected by means of a circular requesting all the State Government offices to furnish the required information. A prescribed proforma along with the instructions for filling it was relayed down to the lowest level office through the administrative and heads of departments through this circular.
- 17. The response was, by and large, satisfactory. As per list of State Government offices furnished to the Directorate of Economics and Statistics, there were 191 offices under the State Government which were required to furnish the returns, 186 of these offices responded to the Consus. The data compiled in this Report relate only to these offices. Till writing of this Report 5 offices have not supplied the information in spite of repeated reminders from different levels. These are:—
 - 1. Officer on Special Duty, Fisheries, Shillong.
 - 2. Superintendent, District Jail, Shillong.
 - 3. District Agricultural Officer, Tura.
 - 4. Givil Surgeon, Tura.
 - 5. Superintendent, District Jail, Tura.
- 1'8. To enable inter- State Comparison of the employees, data for some of the States were collected from the available publications and presented in this report in an additional Table in the Appendix.

Main findings of the Census

- 1. The total number of employees under the Government of Meghalaya as on 31st March, 1972 was 9585. Out of this number 3,070 (32 per cent) were permanent and 6,515 (68.0 per cent) were temporary and otherwise.
- 2. Out of the total number of 9585 employees, 491 (5:12 per cent) were gazetted, 4,563 (47:61 (per cent) were non-gazetted and 4531 (47:27 per cent) were Grade IV employees.
- 3. The Female employees constitute 10.23 per cent of the total number of employees.
- 4. The State Police Department employed the highest number of employees with 22:32 per cent of the total. This is followed by Public Works Department, Medical and Public Health Department, Education Department and Community Development Department with 15:90 per cent, 13:23 per cent, 8:92 per cent and 8:50 per cent respectively as on 31st March 1972.
- 5. Among the three districts of the State of Meghalaya, Khasi Hills. district had the highest concentration of these employees accounting for 61.72 per cent followed by Garo Hills (30.71 per cent) and Jaint a Hills (8.17 per cent).

- 6. State Government Employees in the Secretariat (Shillong) constituted 4:28 per cent and in the heads of the departments (Shillong) 6:60 per cent. The remaining 89:12 per cent of the employees were accounted by other offices.
- 7. The share of female in State Government employment in Khasi Hills district, Garo Hills district and Jaintia Hills district constituted 12.80 per cent, 3.87 per cent and 14.94 per cent respectively.
- 8. The population-employee ratio for Meghalaya works out 106.1 on the basis of the 1971 population figure.
- 9. Out of the total of 9,585 State Government Employees' 1,138 persons were appointed directly by the Meghalaya Government. 8,436 persons were appointed on deputation from the Government of Assam and 11 persons were appointed on deputation from other Governments. These appointments constituted 11.87 per cent, 38.02 per cent and 0.11 per cent respectively.
- 10. State Government Employees drawing a basic pay less than Rs.750 00 per month constituted 98.96 per cent and employees drawing Rs.750.00 or more per month constituted 1.04 percent to the total employees as on 31st March 1972.
- 11. Seventeen different pay scales in the Primary Scale and 23 different pay scale in the Secondary Scale were in existence as on 31st March 1972 State Government Employees drawing pay and allowances in the Primary Scale numbered 8,885, in the Secondary Scale 678 while 22 persons were found drawing pay other than Primary and Secondary Scales. These numbers constituted 92.7 per cent, 7.1 per cent and 0.2 per cent respectively.
- 12. Out of the total number of 9,585 employees, 5062 (52.81 per cent) belonged to Scheduled Tribes (Hills), 143 (1.49 per cent) belonged to the Scheduled Tribes (Plains), 1,209 (12.61 per cent) belonged to Other Backward Classes and 3,059 (31.92 per cent) belonged to other than the abyoe three categories.

ANALYSIS OF RESULTS

2. STATE GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES.

2.1. The total number of State Government Employees as on 31st March 1972 was 9585.

The classification of these employees according to status and tenure of services is given below:

2.2. The Table I above shows that 5.12 per cent of the total number of employees were gazetted, 47.61 per cent were non-gazetted and 47.27 per cent were Grade IV employees. The table also reveals that temporary employees constituted the bulk of the government employment accounting for 68.0 per cent of the total number of employees, while 32.0 per cent of the employees were permanent in their respective posts held on the reference date The ratio varies as between gazetted and non-gazetted (excluding Grade IV) employees.

2.3. Table II below shows the distribution of Female employees on the reference date. The number of Female employees in all category of posts constituted 9.56 per cent in 1970, 10.92 per cent in 1971 and 10.23 per cent in 1972 to the total number of employees in the respective years.

The bulk of the Female employees were found in the Medical and Public Health Department and also in the Education Department. This was due to the appointment of female nurses and female teachers in the Medical Department and Education Department. The female employees in other departments have been mainly employed as typists and in clerical jobs.

The above table reveals that the Police Department employed the highest number of persons (i. e., 22.32 per cent) followed by P.W.D. (15.90 per cent), Medical and Public Health (13.23 per cent), Education (8.92 per cent), and Community Development (3.90 per cent). The above four departments together accounted for 68.9 per cent of the total number of employees of the State Government.

2.6. The percentage of employment in each of the above five departments in the year 1970, 1971 and 1972 is given in Table III (A) below:—

2.7. The table IV below reveals that the highest number of State Government Employees were posted in Khasi Hills district which accounted for 61.12 per cent, followed by Garo Hills and Jaintia Hills district with 30.71 per cent and 8.17 per cent to the total number of employees respectively.

2.8. Table IV (A) below shows the distribution of State Government employees in the Head of Departments and the Secretariat. The Government employees including gazetted, non-gazetted and Grade IV in the Secretariat constituted 4.28 per cent, while those in the Heads of Departments at Shillong constituted 6.60 per cent. All other offices accounted 89.12 per cent to the total number of employees.

2.10. The above table shows that among the three districts of Meghalaya, the Khasi Hills has the highest number of female employees, followed by the Jaintia Hills district and Garo Hills district. The Jaintia Hills, however, recorded the highest percentage (14 94) of female employees.

The percentage of female employees to total number of State Government Employees was 10.23 per cent on the reference date of the Gensus.

2:13. The above table reveals that the employee-population was higher in the Garo Hills District than in the Khasi and Jaintia Hills taken together. The 'Employee-population' ratio for Meghalaya as a whole works out at one employee for every one hundred and six persons of the population.

2.15. During the period under reference, 8,436 employees have been in position on deputation from the Government of Assam and 11 employees from other Governments while 1138 persons were appointed directly by the Meghalaya Government. The appointment on deputation from Government of Assam, deputation from other Governments and appointment directly by the Meghalaya Government constituted 88.02 per cent, 0.11 per cent and 11.87 per cent respectively.
